QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS DOCUMENT

Question	Answer(s)
Can we build a bathroom at Dietrich Park please? All city parks should have a bathroom.	It is a delicate funding balance, to provide the variety of park amenities desired by the community versus the need/desire for a restroom. The City has taken the position of not constructing restrooms in ALL parks and, in particular, not in neighborhood parks. Neighborhood parks are intended to be .5 miles maximum from area homes so residents can walk or bicycle to the park. They are designed for a 1 to 1.5 hour "stay and play" value. Research has shown that, due to the distance from homes, and the duration that people stay at the park, restrooms are not a critical amenity in neighborhood parks. Parks located adjacent to a school, especially those that include sports fields and host organized play attracting visitors from farther away, may have a longer "stay and play" value and could have a restroom. Because of funding available at the time of construction, some schools/parks do not have restrooms. The plan will likely address this need as warranted, so this can be considered for future funding. Thank you for your comments on needed upgrades and repairs. This planning process includes assessing our established parks, and Lincoln Estates Park is included in that assessment.
If any park could benefit from revitalization, it's our charming historic Weber Park- I hope she's included! It's why many of the people in that neighborhood bought a home there - green space is so valuable to locals. We want to see that park shine again!	We agree that greenspace is very valuable. The City has been working with community leaders called Invest Health, who have been conducting surveys, community outreach and participating in neighborhood association meetings. Outcomes of these efforts are being shared with the City. We continue to partner with Invest Health and the community on potential solutions and improvements to Weber Park. An assessment of this park is included in the planning process.
Can we offer more classes for adults and seniors? There used to be things for them (e.g. watercolor classes, etc.) but I don't see things like that anymore (all kids).	We are in the process of expanding offerings in our FAB (Fifty or Better) program and will look at more adult program offerings as we bring on additional staff dedicated to these specific program areas. Thank you for this feedback.
I am really concerned the focus on parks has been exclusive to W. Roseville and the older parks are not getting the love.	Thank you for your comment. The City's philosophy is that growth pays for growth. West Roseville residents pay for the development and maintenance of the neighborhood parks in this area. In the older, more established areas of Roseville, the General Fund pays for reinvestment and maintenance activities. We have developed a 10-year reinvestment plan and this process will assess and make recommendations on reinvestment strategies, including alternative funding sources for such improvements.
Will there be improvement offering more water aerobics classes at Shellito Pool?	We continue to review the pool schedule and seek out additional instructors to ensure we are offering a well-rounded program at the Mike Shellito Indoor Pool. Adding additional classes is dependent on instructor availability and pool space. Unfortunately, we continue to face staffing challenges at this time. Currently, we offer 32 water fitness classes each week, more than we have offered in the past.
Current offerings are extremely limited	During COVID, our ability to offer programs was extremely limited. In recent months we have started more programming, and staff continues to provide new offerings for our residents. If you have specific programs you'd like to see, please let us know.
We'd like to revitalize the park to encourage more usage, but it is often unsafe or unsanitary. I live across the street and am present here tonight to request that the city use funds to make the park fully ADA compliant to allow us to use what little green space we do have. Thanks!	The City has been working with community leaders called Invest Health, who have been conducting surveys, community outreach, and participating in neighborhood association meetings. Outcomes of these efforts are being shared with the City. We continue to partner with Invest Health and the community on potential solutions and improvements to Weber Park. An assessment of this park is included in the planning process.
Pickleball seems to be gaining popularity throughout the community, but there seems to be a dearth of public courts in quantity. I'd love to see a non-membership public pickleball complex with multiple courts, similar to what is available to members-only at Rusch Park in Citrus Heights	Several new courts are now available at Crabb Park, Rocucci Park and Jack Wallace Park at Cresthaven. The tennis courts at Woodbridge Park are dual striped and available for both tennis and pickle ball. More pickleball courts are being planned for the park site at Gibson Drive and Roseville Parkway.
Hi! Please advise if there are any plans to add shade for our playgrounds - in particular for the playground in Mel Hamel park - beautiful playground but ends up not being used because it is in the full sun - no shade above it and just a few trees around. Thank you	As funding opportunities allow, we are looking at how we can add more shade throughout the park system.
I love the planned expansion of the bike trails throughout the city, but it seems to be moving quite slowly, resulting in many small disconnected pieces of the trail. I know this is an ongoing project, but would love to hear an update on planned expansion.	Bike trails are managed by the City's Alternative Transportation Department. The construction of trail segments in the newer growing areas are the responsibility of the developers, so many trails don't connect as of yet. As development continues, the segments of trails will be connected. Also, Alternative Transportation is working on a trail that will connect the east and west sides of the City. This is a large project and will likely take a number of years plus grant funding to complete.
I have heard there is a City of Roseville sports complex planned to go in off Roseville Parkway by Gibson. I would love to hear more about this complex.	The property off of Roseville Parkway by Gibson is envisioned as an "outdoor courts" facility, with pickleball, tennis and basketball courts included. Phase 1 includes the construction of only pickleball courts. Additionally, we are in the beginning planning stages of a soccer complex on Westbrook next to the Waste Water Treatment Plant, which may also accommodate other long field sports such as lacrosse. Since we are only in the preliminary stage of planning this complex, specifics about number of fields, complex design and operations have not yet been identified.
Willard Dietrich Park could use restrooms for our kiddos. Relying on the school to keep their gates open is not a possibility but also unsafe for the after-school kiddos still on campus	Because of funding available at the time of construction, some schools/parks do not have restrooms. The plan will likely address this need as warranted, so this can be considered for future funding. Thank you for this comment.
Is Ronald Fiest park part of Roseville or Granite Bay? Pop Warner foot ball needs a small stadium.	Ron Feist Park is owned and operated by Placer County.

<p>Can we have more open space? More nature. More trees. Less paved areas and constructed parks</p>	<p>The City owns and maintains over 3900 acres of open space. Many are Preserves and many have bike trails. More acres of open space will be dedicated to the City as we continue to move west.</p>
<p>I want to ask that the long-term strategic plan include funding set aside for our older general fund parks. At least one of these parks, Weber Park, is not ADA compliant. Roseville's strategic vision for the next ten years should include an action plan to bring all of our city's parks up to full ADA compliance so that our disabled residents have full access to each park.</p>	<p>The City continues to partner with Invest Health and the community on potential solutions and improvements to Weber Park. <p>use area seniors, numbers of them may be retired teachers, to work w/the libraries or schools as tutors to help kids w/reading and math.</p>	<p>In 2020 we completed a Needs Assessment for the Library's Literacy Program. We are developing a plan as a result of the assessment outcomes and hope to revitalize the literacy program in early 2022. Beyond the literacy program, we will look at how we might more effectively utilize seniors in the libraries. Thank you.</p>
<p>So you are using census data and then a projection to determine a trend/projection?</p>	<p>The Consulting Team is utilizing a combination of census data and data derived from the global leader in demographic and market research data - The Environmental Systems Research Institute (ESRI) - https://www.esri.com/en-us/home - to project demographic trends.</p>
<p>Thanks for extending the new Bike/Walk trail from Fiddymont onward. But it looks very deserted and very dry. Doesn't go with the "Green Roseville" character. The empty area should be planted with Leafy, fast growing trees. Also there should be a row planted close to trail so as to give shade directly on trail on both sides, considering how sunny and hot it gets in Spring, summer and Fall here in our city.</p>	<p>We will pass this along to the City's Alternative Transportation Department, as they plan and design the bike trails throughout the City. We would also want to consider the cost of added maintenance. Parks, Recreation & Libraries partners with Alternative Transportation and Street Maintenance to maintain the trail system.</p>
<p>Would really like city of Roseville to work with their community groups to designate "homes" for their youth programs. This includes storage, restrooms and snack bar facilities that can be run through these community programs. All of our neighboring communities sports leagues have these amenities and only select programs have been given these opportunities in Roseville. What is the long term plan to serve these community groups in an equal way?</p>	<p>We value our partnerships with youth groups and are willing to enter into use agreements that include financial and volunteer contributions to help offset the City's costs for improvements. We currently have such agreements with several area youth groups.</p>
<p>Continue to charge people a fee for their inclusion in Roseville Parks and Rec. programs. I am one of those and can easily afford it.</p>	<p>Thank you for this comment.</p>
<p>Santucci Park - original design was to include a tennis court which has not been installed. Is there a date to have the tennis court or pickle ball court installed there?</p>	<p>To our knowledge, tennis courts were not included in the final master plan. At present, there is not a date to have a tennis court or pickleball court installed there. We will research our archives to see what was included in the Santucci Park final master plan. If tennis/pickleball was indeed intended in the plan, we will consider this amenity for future funding.</p>
<p>Where does running land in these numbers?</p>	<p>Running and jogging are the third most participated fitness activity both nationally and in Roseville.</p>
<p>I would like to see a bike park in the city of Roseville. Many cities are developing an area for recreational bike riding and skills course to improve all types of mountain and BMX bicycle riding. Elk Grove's bike park is a good example of what we could develop on the city. I often take my children an hour or more away to visit these areas. I understand there are proposals for at least one area and I would like to see a push to have this proposal come to life.</p>	<p>A small bike park is included in the master plan for a park in the Campus Oaks area off of Foothills and Blue Oaks, along with other park amenities. Phase 1 of this park will be built by the developer, and we are uncertain whether there is sufficient funding for the construction of this amenity in Phase 1. If that is the case, funding for the bike park will be the responsibility of the City in a future phase. We will likely seek assistance from user groups on design, fundraising, and minor routine maintenance to help us make this amenity a reality.</p>
<p>Is there any goal to build facilities to host tourism events? Softball has consistently brought in national events over the last two decades and each event brings in multi millions of dollars in economic impact to our city. However, Maidu park is aging and is not keeping up with the needs of hosting these major events. The city looks at potentially losing the bids for these major events without some significant upgrades or new multi-field parks (4+ minimum, preferably 8+).</p>	<p>Thank you for this perspective. Having such a facility is certainly a goal. There is currently no funding available for its construction. The need for such a facility will likely be addressed in the plan, to be considered in future years.</p>
<p>How do you count numbers of involvement in sports that are not part of team, official rec. programs? Those general public using tennis courts, basketball courts etc.</p>	<p>Because there is not a single point of entry, we have no way to capture the number of individuals visiting our parks and trails, or utilizing public spaces such as tennis courts, basketball courts, etc. There's no doubt that these spaces see hundreds of thousands of visitors each year.</p>

Are the spots statistic representing what we have available to do rather than what citizens would like to be doing? For example, there seems to be more availability for golf than for tennis and Pickleball in our community. I go to other cities in order to participate in these sports because they are not available in the East Roseville parks.	In East Roseville and East Central Roseville, we currently have tennis courts at Crabb Park, Goto Park, Royer Park, Jack Wallace Park at Cresthaven, and Woodbridge Park. Additionally, several new pickleball courts are available at Crabb Park, Rocucci Park, and Jack Wallace Park at Cresthaven (the Woodbridge Park courts are dual-lined for tennis and pickleball). More pickleball courts are being planned for the park site at Gibson Drive and Roseville Parkway.
Mel Hamel Park has a beautiful playground but it is quite underused because it is in full sun - families simply can't use it most of the times. Please add shading structure and additional trees on the playground	As funding opportunities allow, we are looking at how we can add more shade throughout the park system.
Two questions: 1. How many parks are paid for out of the general fund, and how are those parks funds allocated across these parks? 2. What is the density of affordable housing in Downtown Roseville vs the Rest of Roseville?	50 of the City's 79 parks are paid for out of the General Fund. Routine maintenance dollars are distributed equitably among all of these parks using a standard service level. Reinvestment funding priorities take into consideration size, types of amenities, safety, current conditions, current codes, popularity of use, and other factors.

How can we citizens be given better more salient information about plans that are considered for specific communities in Roseville. I live by Maidu and have heard indirectly about plans for Maidu park that I do not agree with, but have not been notified of any of the discussions related to the decisions being made for my community. Thus, we who live here are not asked/considered regarding our thoughts specific to our geographical community	We have been communicating with the Maidu Neighborhood Association and would like to hear more about your concerns. Nothing has been finalized regarding new improvements, however, there are some elements in the works that will upgrade existing amenities such as a new netting enclosure for the soccer arena, restroom upgrades at the softball fields, and the recent renovation of the turf at the soccer complex. How will you be applying climate adaptation strategies to parks such as increased tree canopy, night time activities (to avoid hottest daytime hours), fire reduction through design, etc.	These strategies are incorporated in the planning phase for our parks as well as ongoing maintenance.

With so many people using running/jogging it would be great to get a public 400m synthetic track in one of our parks. Possibly putting pickleball courts inside the track with lights. This would provide plenty of light for training and exercise in the evening.	Thank you for this comment. Interest in this amenity is being sought through both the statistically valid survey and the public online survey.
Sylvia Besana park also need restroom facilities. This park has soccer games all day on Saturday and I just can't believe there are no restrooms.	Because of funding available at the time of construction, some parks located adjacent to schools do not have restrooms. Additionally, Woodbridge Park courts are dual-lined for tennis and pickleball. More pickleball courts are being planned for the park site at Gibson Drive and Roseville Parkway.
It doesn't seem difficult, also, to add pickleball lines to existing tennis courts.	The Woodbridge Park courts are dual-lined for tennis and pickleball. There are a number of considerations associated with dual lines. Users of either sport find it difficult to play with dual lines and the availability of the courts for either sport is lessened.
Indoor swimming so that it can run in all weather, more tennis courts, pickle ball courts, more indoor space for Volley ball, Badminton etc.	Thank you for this comment. These needs will be considered during development of the plan.
clear marking of all walking/bike trails is a safety need	We will share this comment with the City's Alternative Transportation Department, who plans and designs the walking/bike trails throughout the City.
Dealing with homelessness on trails...	The Parks, Recreation & Libraries Department works very closely with the Roseville Police Department's Social Services Unit to address homelessness in our parks and on our trail. We will continue our efforts in this area.
Do you have a plan to retrofit the libraries for sound dampening/noise mitigation? Since they have become multi use community centers and indoor playgrounds, they are rarely quiet places to do serious study and reading due to extreme ambient noise.	Both the Martha Riley Library and Downtown Library have reading rooms that are free to the public and provide a quiet space to read, do homework, do special projects, etc. Additionally, Martha Riley Library provides a quiet space upstairs behind the reading rooms, with lounge chairs and small couches.
Any Bocce ball areas planned?	We have recently completed several bocce ball courts scattered throughout the park system. New courts have been built at Crabb Park, Phillips Park, and North Hayden Park. Under construction are two more at Four Corners Park.

What are the plans to address more activities and availability of activities/services for our very active senior community for citizens that do not live in a Sun City community?	We are in the process of expanding offerings in our FAB (Fifty or Better) program and will look at more adult program offerings as we bring on additional staff dedicated to these specific program areas.
I would like to suggest that all parks that they city allocates to youth sports (baseball, softball, soccer, football) there are bathrooms provided by the city. You cannot expect a community group to host games or practices at a park without restrooms.	Organized sports fields are typically located in parks adjacent to schools and in city-wide parks, which do have restrooms. However, because of funding available at the time of construction, some parks located adjacent to schools do not have restrooms, and these may be the parks you are referencing. The plan will likely address this need as warranted, so it can be considered for future funding. Thank you for this suggestion.
What about park designs similar to Monopoly Park in San Jose that bring people together as an opportunity to interact, but is also a unique piece of public art at the same time?	The plan may include recommendations on how we can better incorporate art into our parks. Your suggestion is appreciated.
Please use more native plants. They are great for saving water, helping local wildlife, and adding variety and interest to parks. We don't need more of the same old boring selection of urban plants that are not optimal for local wildlife, we need native plants instead. Thanks!	When selecting plantings, we look at the surrounding environment, longevity, aesthetics, and long-term maintenance practices in relation to sustainability. Water-conservation is at the forefront and turf for aesthetic purposes is limited to none.
I also would like to see more than softball on the East Roseville community: bocce ball, Pickleball, tennis, arts, etc.	We currently have tennis courts at Crabb Park, Goto Park, Royer Park, Jack Wallace Park at Cresthaven, and Woodbridge Park. Additionally, several new pickleball courts are available at Crabb Park, Roccucci Park, and Jack Wallace Park at Cresthaven (the Woodbridge Park courts are dual-lined for tennis and pickleball). More pickleball courts are being planned for the park site at Gibson Drive and Roseville Parkway. We recently completed construction of two bocce ball courts at Crabb park. The plan may include recommendations on how we can better incorporate art into our parks. Thank you for your comment.
Can we add water structures to the playgrounds? Would be great for out very long summers	We recognize the play value of these features. There are currently water features in Vernon Street Town Square, Harry Crabb Park in East Roseville, and Nela Luken Park in West Roseville. These are high-cost elements to install and maintain, therefore, we seek to find balance in providing equal access geographically for our residents. Interest in these amenities is being sought through both the statistically valid survey and the public online survey and will help us prioritize these amenities in future park planning in addition to funding strategies.
Are there any plans to add an additional library branch in the Fiddymont Farm area?	There are no current plans for an additional library. We are looking at opportunities to expand library services in West Roseville. Interest in such a facility is being sought through both the statistically valid survey and the public online survey.
Please bring back the karate program. Thank you.	Thank you for this comment.
How much account is taken for patrons living in the County outside City limits?	Participants that do not live within the City are typically charged a non-resident rate for recreation programs and memberships.
I would like to see the library hours increased.	We are in the process of evaluating the library hours with plans to increase the available hours starting in January 2022.
How are parks going to be maintained during drought seasons.	The City has been proactive in water conservation. Prior to the last drought, the City focused on more effective management of our watering schedule. The result was a 30% savings in water. During the last drought, the City removed a large amount of non-usable turf (grass that is not used for recreation but for aesthetics) and converted it to water-conserving landscaping and irrigation. Once the last drought was over, the City continued to use best practices to ensure ongoing water savings. This current drought, we are working with our water conservation team at Environmental Utilities to ensure that we meet current water savings goals while maintaining critical City assets such as sports fields and trees. Lastly, park designs focus on including turf for recreation purposes, efficient irrigation systems that meet the water conservation ordinances and utilizes water-conserving plant material.
Does your plan include adding solar shade structures to parking areas that are oriented for optimally reducing thermal mass and microclimate heating while offering additional energy outlets for public benefits?	We have looked at and continue to explore opportunities for solar at our facilities. We currently have a large solar overhead structure that also shades the spectator area/bleachers at the Roseville Aquatics Complex as well as solar panels at the Mike Shellito Indoor Pool.
Are you considering the demographics of each geographic community in Roseville? Some are younger, middle age, mature citizens. Do you have the geographic demographics by age, income, etc.? Can you provide these if you do have them and share how you will be incorporating that information?	The Consulting Team is currently analyzing the demographics are the Specific Plan Areas of Roseville as part of the master plan project. This information will be available at the end of October, 2021
I second the request for Bocci courts!	We have recently completed several bocce ball courts scattered throughout the park system. New courts have been built at Crabb Park, Phillips Park, and North Hayden Park. Under construction are two more at Four Corners Park.
Will you be able to include strategies around developing greenbelts along dining corridors to increase outdoor recreation connected to dining and allow to-go orders to be consumed in the parks. Also, extending hours in certain corridor parks to enjoy evening or nighttime plazas with outdoor arts like music or theater?	During the planning of newer neighborhoods, the City approached this with walkability in mind. Certain parks/public spaces may lend themselves to use after sunset. The Consulting Team will be reviewing Chapter 8.02 (PARK REGULATIONS) of the City's Municipal Code and recommending amendments, if deemed appropriate, as part of the PRL Master Plan project.
Since this is a 15 year plan, how will emerging trends such as e-sports be considered when the current following may be low?	This plan is a living document that would require periodic updates to ensure new trends are reviewed and considered.
Allow those from adjacent communities/cities to utilize the resources you create, on a "pay for play" basis. Builds your user base most quickly.	Participants that do not live within the City are charged a non-resident rate for recreation programs and memberships.
How is PRL integrated with your emergency management groups and using parks or facilities for disaster response, and in some cases mitigation to disasters (such as floods)?	Our community centers are designated evacuation centers and the Downtown Library is used as a cooling center. We work closely with Public Safety (Fire and Police) on emergency action plans and drills in order to be prepared for natural disasters and community-wide emergencies.

<p>Please bring back the Sea Lions program within the Aquatics program. It is such a valuable program for families that cannot afford to put multiple children in competitive swim team programs like Sea Wilves or CCA. It also provides important daily structure and daily exercise for so many children for 6 full weeks of hot summer weather. The Sea Lions program also provides an opportunity for children to interact with positive young adult role models in a coaching role. More acres of open space will be dedicated to the City as we continue to move west. The City has taken the position of not constructing restrooms in neighborhood parks, and Diamond Oaks is considered a neighborhood park. Neighborhood parks are intended to be .5 miles maximum from area homes so residents can walk or bicycle to the park. They are designed for a 1 to 1.5 hour "stay and play" value. Research has shown that, due to the distance from homes, and the duration that people stay at the park, restrooms are not a critical amenity in neighborhood parks. However, the plan will likely address this need if warranted, so this can be considered for future funding. Thank you for your comments.</p>
